## PASTORS PAGE



As I write this, I have been contemplating Matthew 6:25-34, which are Jesus' instructions to us about not worrying. Are you a worrier, or do you have a worrier in your family?

Kais Rayes writes that he and his wife found their whole life turned upside down when their first child was born. Every night the baby seemed to be fussy, and many nights, it seemed the baby cried far more than he slept. Says Rayes, "My wife would wake me up, saying, 'Get up honey! Go see why the baby is crying!'"

As a result, Rayes found himself suffering from severe sleep deprivation.

While complaining to his coworkers about his problem one day, one of his colleagues suggested a book on infant massage. Rayes immediately went in search of the book and that night, he tried the technique, gently rubbing his baby's back, arms, head, and legs until the baby was completely relaxed and obviously had fallen into a deep sleep. Quietly tiptoeing from the darkened room so as not to disturb the rhythmic breathing of the baby, he made his way directly to his own bed in hopes of enjoying a well deserved full night of sleep.

No such luck. In the middle of the night, his wife awoke him in a panic. "Get up, honey!" she said as she jostled him awake. "Go see why the baby is NOT crying!"

Perhaps you know someone like that. Some people are just worriers. Even when things go well, they worry, they fret, they fume. They worry that something bad will happen.

Dr. Rachel Naomi Remen tells many memorable stories in her book, *Kitchen Table Wisdom : Stories That Heal*.

In one of her stories, she asked one of her patients to describe her husband. The woman laughed and told a story about a visit they made to Hawaii. An organized and frugal man, her husband had reserved compact rental cars on each of the four islands they planned to visit four months in advance. On arriving on the Big Island and presenting their reservation to the rental car desk, they were told the economy car they had reserved was not available. Alarmed, she watched her husband's face redden as he prepared to do battle. The

clerk didn't seem to notice. "I am so sorry, sir", she said. "Will you accept a substitute for the same price? We have a Mustang convertible." Barely mollified, her husband put their bags in this beautiful white sports car and they drove off.

The same thing happened throughout their holiday. They would turn in their car and fly to the next island, only to be told that the car they had been promised was not available. They offered a substitute for the same price and each time the substituted vehicle was an upgrade far nicer than the car they had expected. It was amazing, she said. After the Mustang, they had been given a Toyota Avalon, a Lincoln Town Car, and finally, a Mercedes, all with the most sincere apologies. The vacation was absolutely wonderful and on the plane back, she turned to her husband, thanking him for all he had done to arrange such a memorable time. "Yes," he said, pleased, "it really was nice." Then, much to her amazement, he added, "Too bad they never had the right car for us." She said he was absolutely serious!

Some folks are like that. They can see the dark side of any cloud, even one with a silver lining. They are worriers, and we wonder if they ever read the words of Jesus.

<sup>34</sup>Don't worry about tomorrow. It will take care of itself. You have enough to worry about today.

## COACHING CORNER... YOU, A LEADER? YOU BETTER BELIEVE IT!

As our experiences tell us, leaders come in all shapes and sizes, with all manner of capabilities and limitations. There are leaders on the field of battle, in board rooms and classrooms, in the arenas of both sport and politics. The lesser acknowledged realms of the leader include the family, a group of friends, the community and church. The position of leader can be seized or given, detested or revered, helped or hindered. The Bible is full of leaders that were reluctant—Noah, Moses, Gideon— as well as those that were born to the role—David, Paul, Jesus.

Conventional wisdom has long crowned leaders based on what one does, but newer research in the field of leadership development has determined that leaders are more highly esteemed and more willingly followed based on **who he or she is versus what he or she does**. Aspects of character like humility, honesty, and a consistent willingness to put others before self have immersed as the real draws to following a leader.

It strikes me that those characteristics are some of those most recognized in Christ. Not only did he personify those qualities, but he did and still does invite each of us to grow and live out those qualities in our corners of the world. As he beckons us to live out humility and servant leadership, He is building our “followability.” In other words, Christ is helping us develop the very attributes that current research names as those of highly regarded leaders.

Mark 10:35-45 has a lot to say about the traditional human approach vs. Christ’s approach to leading others.

<sup>35</sup> Then James and John, the sons of Zebedee, came to him. “Teacher,” they said, “we want you to do for us whatever we ask.”<sup>36</sup> “What do you want me to do for you?” he asked.  
<sup>37</sup> They replied, “Let one of us sit at your right and the other at your left in your glory.”<sup>38</sup> “You don’t know what you are asking,” Jesus said. “Can you drink the cup I drink or be baptized with the baptism I am baptized with?”<sup>39</sup> “We can,” they answered. Jesus said to them, “You will drink the cup I drink and be baptized with the baptism I am baptized with,<sup>40</sup> but to sit at my right or left is not for me to grant. These places belong to those for whom they have been prepared.”<sup>41</sup> When the ten heard about this, they became indignant with James and John.<sup>42</sup> Jesus called them together and said, “You know that those who are regarded as rulers of the Gentiles lord it over them, and their high officials exercise authority over them.<sup>43</sup> Not so with you. Instead, whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant,<sup>44</sup> and whoever wants to be first must be slave of all.<sup>45</sup> For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many.”

So where are you living out your leadership? Home, school, work, community, church... all of the above? How committed are you to serving those you lead versus being served by those you led. How “followable” are you? The following list by Perry Noble\* gives **11 ways you can serve the people you lead...** be they in your family, at your work place, on your sports team, on your ministry team.

- #1 Adopt the mindset that people work with me and not for me.
- #2 Provide enough margin for the people who serve with you to be creative and brainstorm ahead.
- #3 Make sure that the people you serve with have the resources they need to do the job they are expected to do.
- #4 Say “thank you” and “great job” A LOT instead of just pointing out all of the areas where a person came up short.
- #5 Try your best to make sure that if an area is going to be impacted by a certain decision that someone from that area had input in the decision making process. (Learned this one from Andy Stanley)
- #6 Make sure the expectations for the people you lead are both spoken and realistic. (We cannot hold people accountable for unspoken, unrealistic expectations.)
- #7 Don’t confuse personal preferences with conviction from the Holy Spirit...if you tell the people you serve with that “God told me,” then you had better be willing to bet your last Bible that you heard from the Lord!
- #8 Model what you consider to be important...in other words, when you are walking into the building and see a piece of trash on the ground...pick it up.
- #9 Listen to them!!!
- #10 Understand that your words weigh 1,000 pounds...choose them carefully!
- #11 Understand that WHAT you say and HOW you say it matter...the people you serve with are human beings with hearts, minds, and souls...they deserve to be treated as such.

When we are living out of a place of humble, healthy serving, we are most like our leader and Lord, Christ. Wherever we find ourselves having influence, following Christ’s leadership model is an opportunity to improve our “followability” and lead others right to Christ.

*A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another.*

John 13:34

- Another person's uptightness when anything concerning faith or religion is mentioned
- Excessive caution so we don't "push our faith down anyone's throat"

- "Insufficient" knowledge of the Bible
- Making "mistakes"
- Fear of rejection
- Uncertainty of another's needs

If you find something of yourself in one or more of the difficulties listed above, forgive yourself for being human. The Lord isn't merely gritting his teeth and using imperfect humans; he likes it that way! He promises:

"My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness" (2Cor. 12:9)

The Sunday morning prayer concern list at Trinity seems to be growing. The bulletin insert is helpful; you can

take it home and add the names to your daily prayers.

What else can you do? You can call someone on that list and say:

- "I saw your name on the prayer concern list on Sunday; how are you?"
- "I'm sorry to hear about \_\_\_\_\_; how are you coming along?"
- "Is there something I can do to help?"

Our lives are busy. Often we go to church on Sunday and then put that aside for the rest of the week because we are so busy. We think, "That's not my job".

I would like to challenge each and every one of you to open your life to Christ's way of Servitude. You don't have to be a pastor, pastoral counselor, or Stephen Minister to be a Christian Caregiver. It is a response to Jesus Christ in your life; you become his ambassador. You don't have to solve the other person's problems; you just become a conduit for God's love. You will be blessed. ## PHYSICAL ACTIVITY



Dear TUMC Family,

*“Jesus replied: “Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.”  
Matthew 22:37 NIV*

Your brain is one of the most important organs in your body since it coordinates all of the body’s functions and thought processes. Without it you couldn’t walk to the store, read your grocery list, count out your change, or hide the chocolate when you get home. It controls involuntary actions such as the beating of your heart and voluntary actions like dialing a phone. A traumatic brain injury (TBI) can happen to anyone and create many challenges for families living with TBI.

Those at highest risk are children 0-4 years old, 15-19 year olds, and military personnel. Although many injuries come from risk-taking activities such as sky diving or race car driving, many stem from normal actions of work and play like driving a car, playing a sport, or even falling at home. Long term effects of TBI include problems with memory, managing emotions, and risk of brain disorders in later years.

Decreasing the chance of an injury is easy with some basic safety practices. **Wear seat belts** to cut down on head injuries in the event of an accident. Have your children **wear helmets** when they ride bikes or rollerblade. **Remove the clutter or throw rugs** in the

homes of your parents and older adults to prevent falls. A simple fall or blow to the head in any of these situations can cause severe complications requiring months or even years of rehabilitation with no guarantee of recovery.

*“Though he stumble, he will not fall, for the LORD upholds him with his hand. Psalm 37:24 NIV*

In the senior population, the majority of traumatic brain injuries are contributed to falls because of problems with balance and vision. Some symptoms of brain injury are similar to those of a stroke, so question the person about any recent falls or injuries when assessing a situation. To prevent falls, encourage the person to strengthen his/her gait through exercise. Assess the home for safety issues; install grab bars in the bathroom, and check for adequate lighting. Check medications for side effects of confusion which might result in a fall. Safety measures are important for the prevention of brain injury.

If an injury does occur, watch the victim for signs of blurred vision, confusion, a severe headache, or repetition of questions or statements after the fall. Contact a doctor or visit the emergency room to determine the severity of the injury. Additional serious signs of a TBI might include violent vomiting, seizures or even loss of consciousness. As with other conditions, a timely visit to the emergency room is essential for long term health.

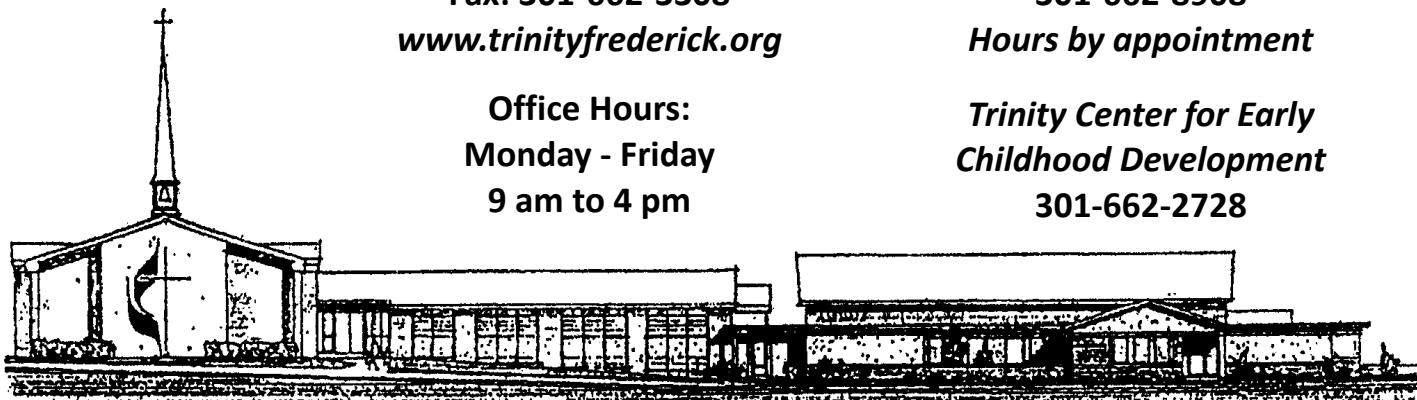
