With your help, the Risk Taking Mission and Service Ministry Team provide tidings of joy with Christmas gifts to residents and clients of Community Living, Inc. and Community Agency School Services (CASS) each year with the Holiday Hope Tree. The tree will be up and ready on **Sunday, November 14**. We need your support to make this a Merry Christmas for these people!

On the Holiday Hope Tree will be two types of ornaments, representing each of these programs. Each ornament will list a specific gift request for a specific person.

Ornaments for the Community Living residents - This organization provides residential service to people with developmental disabilities. These residents, who live in group homes scattered across Frederick County, often have little or no family support.

Ornaments for the CASS program - This collaborative program with Governor Thomas Johnson High and Frederick High identifies teens who may need extra support, particularly during the holiday season.

Participating in the Holiday Hope Tree program is easy:



- Select an ornament from the tree.
- Complete the sign-up sheet located next to the tree.
- Purchase the gift.
- Wrap the gift and tape the ornament to the outside for identification purposes.
- Bring the gift back to the church and place it under the tree in the Narthex **NO LATER than Sunday, DECEMBER 5**.



Distribution of the gifts will be

- at a holiday party in the Multipurpose Room for the residents of Community Living on Sunday, December 12.
- distribution by CASS leaders to the respective high school students.

As you arrive, place your food in the altar area as a part of our thanksgiving offerings for the blessings of God upon us.

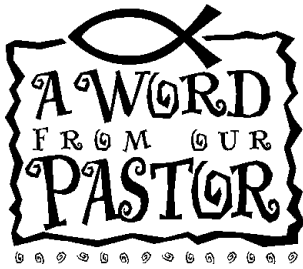
Second Street and Hope is also in desperate need of sleeping bags and men's winter coats. You can place your non-food donations in the box in the Narthex throughout the month.

This summer, my husband Bill and I went to Colonial Beach, Virginia for a day. My reason for going was to see the scenery, Bills was to find a good seafood restaurant. As we drove through the streets that make up Colonial Beach I quickly realized that there were many houses that appeared to be abandoned. Shutters falling off, lawns that had been overtaken by weeds, weather boarding that was in desperate need of paint. It made me sad to see these houses, which I imagine at one time were gorgeous, in such a state of disrepair. I could tell that someone, long ago had put a great deal of time and effort into the designs of these old homes.

One house in particular caught my attention. I stopped the van and just sat on the street looking at it for a time. It must have been 100 plus years old. It sat a block off of the beach. There were many gables designed into this house and each one had the most wonderful scrolled decorations carved from pieces of wood. Because of the age of the house these pieces must have been individually created, not created by machines and mass produced by centers such as the ones that provide most of what we see into today's structures. The house also had the most wonderful porch that wrapped around three sides. As I sat staring, I imagined how the porch must have looked in its day. I could see the wicker furniture, white of course, placed in just the right spots for viewing the front yard. I imagined the family that must have enjoyed their time spent at the house, maybe grandparents, with their children and children's children visiting for their vacation time. While the kids played in the yard, the adults sat on the porch sipping their ice tea as the cool breeze blew in from across the Potomac. What a wonderful sight.

But, that day, I was sitting in my car, with the temp being 104, no cool drink in hand, looking at a rundown house that evidently no one wanted. It made me sad.

Aren't we blessed as humans to have an architect, a builder, a designer that never walks away from us to leave us alone and no longer cared for. Like the house we may grow weather worn from our life experiences but unlike the house, our God, our Creator, our Designer is always there to strengthen us and keep us in shape. Now God may not place a new coat of skin on us as our physical body begins to wrinkle and get weaker, but when we follow his instruction for our life he does provide us with a spirituality that will only grow stronger and healthier as time goes by. We also will reap the benefits of a new spiritual body that will never grow tired, sick, old or wrinkled. Something that really excites me about our promises of that new body is the promise that we will know each other when we meet in heaven. It gives me goose bumps to think that God loved us enough to give us each other here and now, but He also loves us enough to make sure that those who are spiritually growing with us now, will be there when we reach eternity. Praise God!!!!

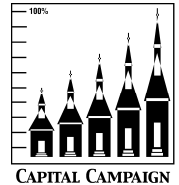
THANKSGIVING WORSHIP AND BREAKFAST

STEPHEN MINISTRY REFLECTIONS



Commission: authority granted for a particular action or function; to authorize, send on a mission.

Christ made a ceremony of commissioning. In Matthew 28:18-20, Jesus gathered the disciples together and said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the very end of the age." As the disciples began their ministry, these words Jesus spoke to them surely helped them when they faced doubt, disbelief, and persecution. Jesus' commission left no doubt in their minds that their work was right and eternally important.

When the work of the apostles grew too great for them to accomplish everything, "and they chose Stephen, a man full of faith and of the Holy Spirit; also..... They presented these men to the apostles, who prayed and laid their hands on them." Acts 6: 5-6. This is an example of a biblical practice that can be called commissioning. When God called people to a special ministry, others in the community would lay hands on them, pray for them, and send them out to do their ministry.

Trinity's Stephen Ministry program began in 2007 and enables our congregation to minister to those who can benefit from of the gentle support of Christ's unwavering love. On Sunday, November 14, Trinity will commission new Stephen Ministers and one new Stephen Leader. These new members join eight other Stephen Ministers and four Stephen Leaders. Stephen Ministers and Stephen Leaders have answered a special call to use their gifts to follow in Jesus' caring footsteps. They have completed extensive hours of additional training to equip them for their task.

The entire Trinity congregation now has the opportunity to carry on the biblical tradition of commissioning those who have responded to God's call to be part of our congregation's Stephen Ministry. During the commissioning service, the new Stephen Ministers & Stephen Leader will state publicly their promises to serve God, their future care receivers and their congregation. This program provides an opportunity for individuals of all ages to be involved in a simple, hands on mission project that reaches out to children suffering from war, poverty, illness, natural disaster or neglect, while focusing on the true meaning of Christmas - Jesus Christ.

The project is simple. Pick up an Operation Christmas Child brochure from the lobby. Find an empty shoe box, wrap the bottom of the box, and wrap the lid separately. Choose a boy or a girl, choose an age group (2-4, 5-9, 10-14). Fill the box with toys, school supplies, and basic hygiene items. Children's Ministries

On October 24th we had five second grade children receive Bibles from Trinity Church! This was a very special day and congratulations go out to Ella Fitzgerald, Jordan Hastie, David Hombach, Willow Hoffman and Colleen Scafide. After receiving their Bibles, the children and their families attended a special ceremony where the children were able to unwrap their Bibles. The following is a portion of the service that helps to explain to the children how important their Bibles are. Each Bible is wrapped in four layers.



*The Bibles are wrapped in brown paper to remind us that this is a very old book. It is thirty centuries old. Some parts of this book were composed more than a thousand years before Christ. Some of the stories come down to us from a time before people could even write. This is the ancient sacred book of our faith.

*The Bible is then wrapped in a thin layer of gold foil. This is to remind us that the Bible is very valuable, more valuable than gold. People have been imprisoned because they read this book. Some have even died to save this book from being destroyed. Our Bible, our sacred Scripture, is both ancient and valuable.

*The Bible is next wrapped in comic strips. Our Bibles are filled with wonderful stories. We have heard them in Sunday School, and now we can read them for ourselves. There are adventure stories and miracle stories, stories of heroes, stories of villains. As we read them, we must look beyond the stories, look for the lessons they teach. We must try to understand how these lessons can be used in our lives. Noah teaches us the lesson of trusting in God. We can use our "God-trust" to seek answers that await us in these stories. Our Bible is not only ancient and valuable, but it is also entertaining.

*Lastly, the Bible is wrapped in white. This color is to remind us that the Scripture is inspired. It came from a people who had a special understanding of God. It is not like any other book we will ever own. When we read it, we will understand what God is like and what God wants us to do. We have a message from God, about God wrapped in this ancient, valuable, entertaining, inspired scripture.

Remember, the Bible is there for each of us. The truths told above, are as true for each of us now as when we received *our* first Bibles!

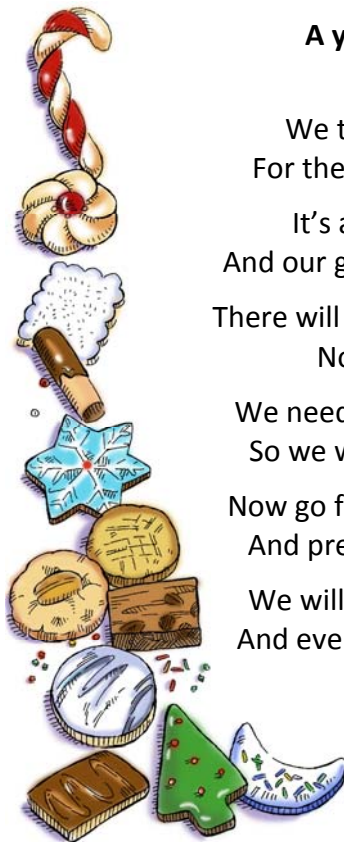

ALZHEIMER'S AWARENESS



Many of you will have seen or will participate in the Alzheimer's Association Memory Walks in and about Maryland. Their mission is to eliminate Alzheimer's and enhance care and support for individuals, their families and caregivers. The funds raised by the walks support the mission of the AA. They offer 5 core services: 1) referral and information, which includes a telephone helpline service, 2) support groups, 3) care consultation, 4) educational programs, and 5) the Safe Return identification program.

Alzheimer's disease causes progressive deterioration of the mind. There is no specific test used to diagnose Alzheimer's disease. This disease attacks the brain and results in ongoing memory loss, as well as problems with thinking and behavior. Most persons with AD live from 1 – 15 years after they have been diagnosed and death is usually caused by respiratory or urinary tract infections. There is no cure for this disease but a structured setting, community and church support can ease the family's responsibility.

Today it is estimated that 4.5 million Americans have Alzheimer's. That includes 10 percent of those over 65 years old and nearly 50 percent of those 85 and older. By 2050, that number may reach 16 million. Because 70 percent of those with Alzheimer's live at home, the impact of the illness extends to millions of family members, friends and caregivers.

10 Warning signs of Alzheimer's disease:

- **Memory loss** – forgetting recently learned information is one of the most common early signs of dementia
- **Difficulty performing familiar tasks** – people with dementia often find it hard to plan or complete everyday tasks

- **Problems with language** – people with Alzheimer's often forget simple words or substitute unusual words, making their speech or writing hard to understand
- **Disorientation to time & place** – many can become lost in their own neighborhoods, forget where they are and how they got there, and not know how to get back home
- **Poor or decreased judgment** – folks with AD may dress inappropriately, wearing several layers on a warm day or little clothing in the cold, show poor judgment about money, like giving away large sums to telemarketers
- **Problems with abstract thinking** – someone may have unusual difficulty performing complex mental tasks, like forgetting what numbers are and how they should be used
- **Misplacing things** – they might put things in unusual places: an iron in the freezer or a wristwatch in the sugar bowl
- **Changes in mood or behavior** – the disease may show rapid mood swings, from calm to tears to anger for no apparent reason
- **Changes in personality** – personalities can change dramatically, they may become extremely confused, suspicious, fearful or dependent on a family member
- **Loss of initiative** – a person may become very passive, sitting in front of the TV for hours, sleeping more than usual or not wanting to do usual activities

Living with Alzheimer's disease can be an opportunity for Christian witness and services. God alone has the ability to make something good out of disease, impairments and suffering (Romans 8:28-32). Please help yourself to the information offered at our Parish Nurse resource center.

UPDATES FROM THE COUNSELING CENTER



We are pleased to let you know that Diane Younkins has joined us at the Counseling Center as a part-time counselor. Diane graduated from Loyola's pastoral counseling program in 2006. She is a Licensed Graduate Professional Counselor on her way to becoming a Licensed Clinical Professional Counselor. Diane did clinical internships at Catholic Charities and Counseling Services and now has a private practice in Knoxville, Maryland. She will see clients - individuals and couples - on Mondays and Thursdays and hopes to eventually offer a group to family caregivers. As well as her counseling experience she comes with a rich background in work and volunteer and life experience. I'm looking forward to the contribution I believe that she will make to our ministry.

In a recent monthly newsletter it was reported that based on our projected expenses in comparison to our actual income the counseling center is \$17,000 in the red. I want to reassure the church that based on our actual expenses in comparison to our actual income we were only \$4,666 in the red as of the end of August. At that time there was \$4,000 in our scholarship fund and we were owed money by some insurance companies. Of course our goal is to break even at the end of the year. I hope that this information is reassuring.

Also, to repeat what has been in the weekly newsletter...The Counseling Center's scholarship fund enables us to continue to provide counseling for those who can't pay our minimum fee. This fund is supported by contributions. One way to contribute is through the Combined Charities Campaign for the Frederick County Government, the City of Frederick and the Frederick County Public Schools. The Campaign will run from until November 22, 2010.

Another way to contribute is through the United Way of Frederick. Just write on the enrollment form "other non-profit agency" and include our name and address: Trinity Pastoral Counseling Center, 703 W. Patrick St., Frederick, Md. 21701. This gift must be at least \$50 in order for the United Way to accept the designation because TPCC is a 501-3-C non-profit agency.

We will not be participating in the Combined Federal Campaign of the National Capital Area but we will be next year. For this year, for those who have contributed faithfully and generously through this campaign, if you still want to contribute, direct contributions would of course support us as well.

Of the clients that we saw in October 25% of them could not afford our minimum fee. With your help we have been able to continue to provide counseling for these people. THANK YOU in advance for your contributions.

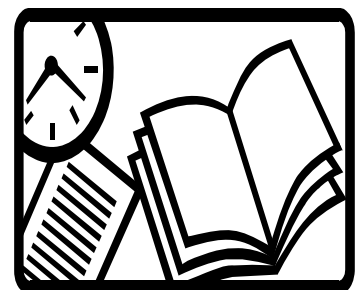
