
## Come to hear a FREE panel discussion about experiences and spiritual perspectives of immigrant children

o-authors and immigrant youth will discuss immigration issues described in *Blessed Are the Refugees*, a newly released book of eight story-reflections about children who fled Central America on their own to escape violence. The book was written by attorneys and volunteers of Esperanza Center Immigration Legal Services, a program of Catholic Charities of Baltimore, with a foreword by Joe Biden and Illustrations by an immigrant youth who is also a musician and will sing at the event. The book has significant local ties, with two of the co-authors (Scott Rose and Cary Plamondon) being Frederick residents, as well as several of the immigrant youth discussed in the book and presenting on the panel.

Presented in partnership with ERUCC and Curious Iguana, Downtown Frederick's independent bookstore, the event is free and open to the public, and no registration is required. Books with be available for purchase and signing. All author and artist royalties of the book go to benefit Esperanza Center and Jesuit Refugee Service.
