From the Pastor's Desk...

The central core of Christian teaching is expressed in one of the most wonderful stories of the New Testament: the nativity. Through this story we see the work of an awesome God who would not rest to reach out to us, seeking us so that we can be in relationship with God. As Paul says in Philippians: *...rather, he made himself nothing by taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness. And being found in appearance as a man, he humbled himself... (2:7-8a).* Or, as Paul says in 2 Corinthians: *[I]n Christ God was reconciling the world to himself. (5:19)*

In this powerful story we have been told how a loving God came to be with us because of God's great love for us (John 3:16); this is truly The Wonder of Christmas, the study we are pursuing for this season of Advent.

For the past 80 plus years, we have been hearing people talk about putting Christ back into Christmas, and as great as that sounds we must be wise about its meaning. What does it mean to put Christ back in Christmas? Is it a matter of just having the name on the celebration or really celebrating Jesus' words and life for a hurting world? Many times when I hear the expression of putting Christ back on Christmas, I am reminded of the **words of Jesus in Matthew**: *You hypocrites! Isaiah was right when he prophesied about you: "These people honor me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me. They worship me in vain; their teachings are merely human rules." (15:7-9; see also Isaiah 29:13).*

A season that should be one of the highest holidays of Christendom has become just a mere commercial enterprise where the only vestige of Christ left is in the name for the season: Christ/mas. At this point, of course, we start blaming the atheist, the secularist, the liberals, (media, pastors, politicians, etc.), store owners, and anyone else that we think has anything to do we co-opting or corrupting the holiday.

The fact of the matter is that we need to recover the message of Jesus for a broken world, we must recover the teachings and actions of Jesus, as we seek to proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom of God that he proclaimed (*Luke 4:18-19*). We, the Christians of the 21st Century, who have inherited the message and teachings of Jesus, we have forgotten that faith in the living Messiah is not an intellectual ascent or a cultural celebration, but rather, a life gripping commitment to live, and act like Jesus. The steadfastness of our faith in the Christ of Christmas is not shown in a description of one's orthodox beliefs, but rather, in the way one lives life in the world, in the way we love each other (*see Matthew 25:31-46*).

This year, I decided that it will be great to be reminded of this event we call Christmas as we participate in *"The Wonder of Christmas: Once You Believe Everything is Possible."* This program seeks to help us reflect on the meaning of Christmas by helping us to respond to the question of why is God mindful of us today?

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Do the ways we celebrate Christmas honor the message of Jesus, or glorifies God? We will seek to answer these questions during this season.

In our Advent journey we will explore the key points of this study: the star, the name, the manger, and the promise. Every week during Advent we will unravel what each of these points teach us about Christmas, and about God's amazing, never ending, and reckless love.

At the heart of The Wonder of Christmas is a challenge to us about how we really feel about the season. During Christmas our lives should show the love of God for the world. Our actions, our way of being, our commitments should reflect this love of God, and our values should reflect the values of the one we proclaim to be our savior. The Christmas celebration is not simply a way for us to remember that Jesus was born, but rather, the story of Christmas should help us remember what God has done, is doing, and will continue to do to bring us to a personal relationship.

Therefore, this Advent season let us come to worship our God more fully, let us surrender our lives completely to him just like the shepherds and the wise men did. Let us spend less in things we do not need, things that are trivial and of fleeting value. Let us give more to those causes that will make a difference in people's lives, let us, like Jesus, save lives by helping those whom God loves. For it is by loving like God loves that the world will know that putting Christ back in Christmas is more than a political slogan, *it is a way of life (John 13:35)*.

Come join us in The Wonder of Christmas, and may you have a Christmas fill with hope, peace, love, and joy.

Churches Adapting to a Changing Community

Recently, I attended a conference that provided me the rare opportunity to combine my faith with my work. (I am an auditor and all my clients are involved in the affordable housing industry, whether they are non-profit developers or a multi-family housing property). The conference was developed by the **Housing Association of Nonprofit Developers (HAND) and Enterprise**, and it was part of a Faith-Based Development Initiative focusing on the affordable housing crises in America. The conference was titled Houses of Worship in a Changing Community: The Suburbanization of Poverty and Urban Displacement. The conference brought together the faith-based community and the business community to discuss how to work together to address poverty in the region as well as the dire need for affordable housing.

In one of the panels participated the *Rev. Dr. Wanda Bynum-Duckett, Baltimore Metropolitan District Superintendent of the Baltimore-Washington Conference of the United Methodist Church*. It was a blessing for me to hear the insight from different clergy from the various denominations, speaking to the challenges that churches face, in addition to discussing ways for churches to address issues of poverty and affordable housing. Each panel member discussed the various ways in which the local church is working to address the issues.

Some churches worked with developers to build affordable housing apartment properties on the vacant lots that were adjacent to the church property (*there are approximately 800 vacant lots owned or affiliated with houses of worship*). In addition to providing much needed housing, the churches offer training or other programs to the residents. One church discussed partnering with another church to pool together their assets and limited resources to address poverty in the local area.

During one of the panels' discussions we were told that dealing with affordable housing for congregations, and the community at large, is a social justice issue, which they all thought was a part of the church's role and mission. No one in the audience or the panel saw a negative connotation for the term "social justice." Most churches do not have the financial resources to help but they do have many assets that can work to care for those impoverished in our communities. Some churches are building multi-family housing apartments, some are using the space in the building for different community programs such as food pantries to feed the poor, clothing closets and job training skills among other things. Also, church members are an asset, with knowledge and skills that can be used.

As individuals working together, there are many things that a church can accomplish. As one Pastor said, "Faith leaders change through faith". In other words, with our faith we can work together to make changes that make a difference. I believe that for Trinity to continue to be a part of the solution in Frederick will require that we rethink our understanding of social justice. We know that helping those who live in poverty is not a bad thing. *Jesus loves everyone and taught us to share that love with all, especially those who live in poverty (Matthew 25: 31-46).*

The common theme was that the church needs to have a relationship with the local community and respond to the real problems people are confronting. Within the Frederick area, there are many in need. I believe that as followers of Jesus, we must be involved in helping and be intentional about local missions. There are many ways to help, we just need to find our way to respond to God's calling on us. Trinity's community is changing and, therefore, we need to change in order to respond to the new challenges we are being asked to address as God's people. We can only grow as we seek to strengthen our relationship with our surrounding community. Trinity needs to challenge itself in order to grow, and in order to strengthen its relationships in the community. Churches can no longer sit and wait for people to come to them as demonstrated in many recent studies. We must rethink our role without sacrificing our core values and beliefs. This work belongs to all of us.


