From the Pastor's Desk...It is time for a Revival in the American Church

During the last few years, I have been describing at different meetings and gatherings of Trinity the reality of religious decline in American society (which also means Frederick). In a recent study realized by the Pew Research Center, they found that 65% of American adults describe themselves as Christians when asked about their religious affiliation. This is down 12 percentage points over the past decade. On the other hand, the religiously unaffiliated share of the population, consisting of people who describe their religious identity as atheist, agnostic or "nothing in particular," now stands at 26%, *up from 17% in 2009*. This means that in the last ten years less people are showing up to church, or to any organized religious group.

Some people have argued that the reason for the decline of Christianity in America has to do with the Church's accommodation to cultural values that are contrary to Christian teaching. I, for my part, agree with the statement in principle. I believe that we, as Christians, have adopted the values of our dominant culture, as if they actually were the same as the values of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. At different times in our cultural development we, Christians, have come to adopt values such as believing that people of African descent were only 3/5th of a human being. This idea, which became law of the land, was enshrined in our Constitution (Article 1, Section 2).

We came to believe that Native Americans' segregation into reservations, established by law, was an acceptable practice. Between 1929 and 1936 an estimated 2,000,000 people of Mexicans ancestry were

removed from their homeland, the U.S.A., and sent to Mexico. Of those removed from the U.S., sixty percent were birthright citizens. This was done by the law and by our cultural agreement, which sustained that these folks were different from us, meaning white.

Under the common law legal doctrine known as coverture, a married woman in the United States had hardly any legal existence apart from her husband. Her rights and obligations were subsumed under her husband. Women could not vote, own property, enter into contracts, or earn a salary. By law, we, Christian people, established policies of segregation in our land that created and supported disparities and neglect over various segments of our population, we called them Jim Crow Laws.

For many Christians, especially those who had power in our country, and who had power in our churches, these policies were not only good but necessary for a good society. However, there were many other Christians who disagreed with these ideas, cultural values, laws, and policies. Christians who will break immoral laws, life denying laws, in their obedience to a higher law: God's Good News in Jesus Christ. This obedience to the Gospel made possible an end to slavery, segregation, and discrimination; their obedience, and their faithfulness to God, made possible changes to the constitution (the 13th Amendment, the 14th Amendment, the 15th Amendment, and the 19th Amendment), which recognized the full humanity of people of color and women. For these Christians the most important law was that of God's love for the world.

Love is the main principle of Christian life, as it is the main principle of the Kingdom of God, as John reminds us in his first letter: Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them. Those who say, "I love God," and hate their brothers or sisters, are liars; for those who do not love a brother or sister whom they have seen, cannot love God whom they have not seen. (4:7-8, 16b, 20).

But love must be understood not as something we do because it makes us feel good but rather because it is our way of imitating the character of God. There will be occasions in which we are going to find that to love as we have been loved means to be willing to risk our own safety and well being just as Jesus did (Philippians 2:1-8). So this love that our Holy Scriptures speak about it is not a sentimental matter, but rather, it is at the core of our Christian teaching, which will take us to challenge and confront the powers of this world, the cultural values of our society, and the laws of the land that reject the values of the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

I believe that the Good News Jesus preached is life giving, life sustaining, and life affirming. For the Gospel all life is worthy of value because God has so decreed (John 3:16). Therefore, any law or practice that denies the values of the Gospel are contrary to the message of Jesus; and from my perspective must be rejected and opposed.

Therefore, I believe that if we turn ourselves to the Gospel message that Jesus preached and taught, we will see people coming to faith in Jesus, people coming to be in the fellowship of the Christian community, a community that sustains and teaches people that to love is the key to abundant life. I believe that if we live out the love of God in the world we will experience a Christian revival in American society and around the world. The "nones," the "dones," the unbelievers, the millennials, the poor, and the oppressed will come to experience the love, mercy, and compassion of God the way Jesus' showed us: *This is my command: Love one another the way I loved you. This is the very best way to love. Put your life on the line for your friends. (John 15:12-13, The Message)*

Let us pray for this revival! May you have a blessed thanksgiving time with friends and family.






A VETERAN'S DAY OBSERVANCE

Blessed Are the Poor in Spirit

A few weeks ago, I met a pregnant 19-year-old girl. Though she was an adult in age, she was quite the child in life experiences. She was raised in a very sheltered, strict, religious household, so there was never any talk about boys when she was growing up. She was quite unprepared for the fickleness and dynamics of teenage relationships and unfortunately, the consequences of her lack of knowledge will last her a lifetime. When she became pregnant, her family was unsupportive and kicked her out of the house. At the time that I met her, she was living in a tent in a park, alone, expecting to have a baby in about 3 weeks. This girl was organized, intelligent, had taken classes at a local community college and was determined to better herself and have a good life for herself and her child. However, she had nowhere to stay and was homeless. She could not raise a child in a tent and was looking for shelter to stay.

Around the same time of meeting the 19-year-old girl, I was introduced to an older woman who had some mental challenges, was taking her meds as prescribed, and had a place to live. She asked me if I had an extra book bag because the one that she had on her back was beyond tattered. It held all of her life's belongings. I told her that I would check around for her. When I was at the office at Trinity, I mentioned this story to our beloved Heather Throckmorton and she went and pulled out a suede backpack that she used in college at Vanderbilt and gave it to me, to give to her. The next time I saw this woman, she asked if I had the backpack and I told her yes. When I pulled it out, she looked at it, her eyes lit up, and she grabbed it from me and hugged it to her chest, stroking the suede as if it was a pet. She said that she never received such a nice gift in her life and she started crying. As she hugged me she started crying, crying that turned to sobs. I told her that it was a gift from a friend and colleague from church, she asked me to thank my friend, and that she felt blessed to receive such a gift from someone she never met. Later that day I sent a text to Heather to let her know that her gift made a huge impact on this woman's life.

These are just two faces of the impoverished, and there are thousands and thousands of people like them in our own communities. Poverty is all around us, and many families that are experiencing it are the working poor. People with two or three low paying jobs who are barely scraping by or not able to make ends meet. They are one bad break away from total calamity. A car repair, an unforeseen medical bill, a sick dog... anything can easily make their situation much worse.

Our Grow Time class has been studying poverty the past three weeks. In the first session, we watched a video based on the book "When Helping Hurts" by Steve Corbett and Brian Fikkert. Their thesis shows that poverty is due to broken relationships with God and that we hurt the impoverished by just giving them handouts. So they argue that we should find the underlying cause of their situation and help them get out of their circumstances. They posit that we should not just give the impoverished money or material things for their immediate needs; instead, we should provide them with skills, training, mental health assistance or anything else that they need to make them productive citizens.

The second week we watched another video called "Justice for the Poor" by Reverend Jim Wallis. He understands that we should do all that we can to help those impoverished; that is something Jesus did and would want us to do. He said that it was our moral imperative as Christians to help those living in poverty.

According to the Institute of Policy Studies, 140 million Americans are poor or low income and 43% of the population struggles to make ends meet. Of that massive number, 42 million people get food stamps and about 20 million children receive free or reduced fee meals. Congress is looking to cut the Food Stamps program in order to save \$200 billion over 10 years. This will result in 3.1 million people not getting the assistance they need at this time. These changes, and others proposed, will have a adverse impact on those living in poverty.

In Frederick County, 8% of residents live below the federal poverty level and another 31% live below the ALICE level (Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed) which means they can't afford the cost of living in the

state. Within 3 miles of Trinity, we have families that are living in relative poverty. Some even attend our church. Trinity is a loving church, we do a lot for the poor overseas, and we help organizations locally. Many individuals give of their time to help the impoverished, elderly and needy who live nearby. However, is there anything collectively as a church that we can do to help alleviate material and spiritual poverty? Trinity is a beacon of light in the community, so what should our response be to local poverty alleviation efforts? Working together we can make a difference in Frederick and around the world.

Operation Christmas Child

Operation Christmas Child uses gift-filled shoeboxes to demonstrate God's love in a tangible way to children in need around the world, and together with the local church worldwide, share the Good News of Jesus Christ. Through the power of a simple gift, hearts are touched, lives are changed, and even whole communities are transformed. Here are several ways you can be a part of this ministry.

1. Bring a gift filled shoe box on Sunday, November 10th.

The project is simple. Pick up an Operation Christmas Child brochure from the lobby. Find an empty shoe box, wrap the bottom of the box, and wrap the lid separately. Or take one of the pre-wrapped shoeboxes that are in the lobby. Choose a boy or a girl; choose an age group (2-4, 5-9, 10-14). Opportunities for Charitable Giving

At this time of year, we tend to think about the things we are thankful for, and perhaps, how to minimize our income tax bills. Either way, it all comes down to one thing: we have been blessed with material and nonmaterial things and some of us have been fortunate enough to have to worry about paying taxes because of the generosity of God our Father. What better way to thank Him than to give some of these riches back so His work can continue. In addition to the giving of a monetary gift, there are many ways you can support the ministries and missions of Trinity United Methodist Church.

- I. <u>Gift of your time and talents:</u> God has given each of us talents and the church often has a need for those skills. You can help the Church with your skills, such as plumbing, HVAC, electrical, gardening, fixing appliances or lawnmowers, painting, computers, lighting, sewing, etc. Let the Church know how you would like to help by putting a business card or note in the offering plate or calling/emailing the church office.
- 2. <u>Gift of appreciated property</u>: Yes, the Dow is up. Some of us have appreciated stock, bonds, real estate or collectibles. The property must have been owned at least one year. You get a charitable deduction for the average market value as of the date of the gift and you do not have to pay capital gains because you gifted the property rather than the cash.
- 3. Stock in a privately held company: Does your closely held company wish to buy back some of its stock? Your shares could be donated to the church and the company would buy the stock from the church. The church receives the proceeds of the sale and you avoid recognizing capital gains. You also get a charitable deduction based on the appraised value of the stock.
- 4. <u>Sale of depreciated stock:</u> Do you have a stock that has gone down in value and it doesn't look like it will be going up anytime soon? Consider selling the stock and give the proceeds as a monetary gift. Not only will you get the charitable deduction, you will also be able to claim a loss on your tax return, subject to limitations.
- 5. <u>Life Insurance:</u> An easy and direct form of planned giving is through a new life insurance policy. You make Trinity the beneficiary and owner of the policy. The premiums are tax-deductible and policies can be paid up within a few years. Do you have an existing life insurance policy? If you transfer the ownership of the policy to the church and make the church the beneficiary, you will receive a charitable deduction in the amount of the cash surrender value at the time of transfer. Any additional premiums paid would be tax deductible.
- 6. <u>Charitable Remainder Trust or Charitable Gift Annuity:</u> Do you have investments but you need an income stream from the dividends or interest to pay your bills? You can set up a charitable remainder trust or a charitable gift annuity. The trust or annuity will pay you until your death with the remainder going to the church after death.
- 7. <u>Charitable lead Trusts:</u> Do you have investments and desire to leave your estate to your heirs? There are charitable lead trusts that can be set up where the first 15 20 years the annual payments go to the church, and, afterwards, the remaining funds revert to your heirs.
- 8. <u>Your Will:</u> Do you have investments but you want to make sure you have enough to take care of you through your retirement years? Consider including the church in the provisions of your will.

As Jesus said "Freely you have received; freely give" (Matthew 10:8)
