From the Pastor's Desk

Beloved, it is a difficult time right now, with challenging new developments coming to us on an hourly basis. Like you, we are watching and waiting and doing our best to care for the vulnerable and act with regard to the common good. When we've done all that we can do, there is still one thing left: to pray.

Today, as we pray, we can take this opportunity to be part of the rebuilding of societal trust by walking in a manner worthy of our calling as disciples of Jesus (*Ephesians 4:1*). During this time of uncertainty people of faith can help others to trust God, and to rely on God for our future. As the Apostle Paul affirms: "For in Him we live and move and have our being." "We are His offspring." (*Acts 17:28*).

As we seek to be present in our communities, and with our families, showing them love, mercy, compassion, and mercy. We are reminded of the song "St. Patrick's Breastplate." This is a prayer for protection. The prayer reflects the medieval custom of knights who placed inscriptions of prayers in their breastplates and then recited them as they rode into battle. So strong was this association that one of the hymn's alternate titles – Lorica, Latin for 'breastplate' – came to be used broadly for any prayer for protection.

Thus, let us invoke on our families, our communities, our state, and our country the power of this beautiful prayer:

I bind to myself today

The strong virtue of the invocation of the Trinity: I believe the Trinity in the Unity, The Creator of the universe.

I bind to myself today

The virtue of the incarnation of Christ with His Baptism, The virtue of His crucifixion with His burial, The virtue of His Resurrection with His Ascension, The virtue of His coming on the Judgement Day.

I bind to myself today

God's Power to guide me, God's Might to uphold me, God's wisdom to teach me, God's Eye to watch over me, God's ear to hear me, God's Hand to guide me, God's Way to lie before me, God's Shield to shelter me, God's host to secure me, That I may receive abundant reward. Christ with me, Christ before me, Christ within me, Christ above me, Christ at my right, Christ at my left, Christ in the fort, Christ in the chariot seat, Christ in the rear deck, Christ in the heart of everyone who thinks of me, Christ in the mouth of everyone who speaks to me, Christ in every eye that sees me, Christ in every ear that hears me.

The strong virtue of an invocation of the Trinity, I believe the Trinity in the Unity The Creator of the universe.



April is **National Alcohol Awareness Month**. Alcohol can be viewed as a helpful or harmful, depending on your point of view. In small doses, it can be relaxing and good for the circulatory system. However, there is a wide grey area between casual use, developing a problem, and, later, a dependence or addiction to alcohol.

Abuse is when alcohol or any other substance creates problems in our lives. **Addiction** is a physical withdrawal when not drinking. These go beyond the social drinking that occurs on special occasions.

During this month, it might be a good time to consider how drinking impacts you or, maybe, someone around you. How can you know if it is a problem? While many people may be able to drink socially or casually, alcohol abuse can enter a more slippery slope from acceptable use towards harming oneself and/or others. There can be the problem of denial with abuse or addiction to consider.

Let's take good care of ourselves. Respect how different people have different tolerances and responses to alcohol. There is no one-size fits all approach with alcohol. Remember, alcohol can be cunning in how we tend to minimize its impact on our lives and those around us. However, how we use it is our responsibility. If there are concerns, we would be happy to help you with resources to get you started.

Rethinking Church By Curtis A. Osborne

Have you ever wondered what the future of the Christian church will look like? Many churches, denominations, pastors, seminaries and theologians have pondered the question over the years and have sought ideas that will ensure that the church will go on forever and stay relevant.

In October of 2019, the Pew Research Center released a new update on America's changing religious landscape. The title of the report was "In U.S., Decline of Christianity Continues at Rapid Pace". That certainly was a headline grabber and caused increased worry and consternation in the Christian church. According to the survey, in 2019, 65% of American adults described themselves as Christian, down from 77% just a decade ago in 2009. Those who have no religious identity such as atheists, agnostics or "nones" is now at 26%. Church attendance has dropped as well, going from 52% who regularly attended in 2009, now down to 45%. In short, attendance is lagging, and most churches are not growing. Now that is not true for all churches.

There are a myriad of complex reasons why this decline has occurred, though many church watchers tend to point their fingers at the millennials or nones, who feel that the traditional church does not inspire them spiritually and is too judgmental. They want a more open, mission oriented, less tradition focused church. Their departure from church is certainly one reason for the decline in church attendance but there are other cultural reasons at play as well.

Though the numbers may paint a dire picture, the future of the church is far from bleak. There are many outstanding Christians in ministry that are doing things to shake up the traditional church model and present exciting plans for the church future and survival. Many churches and denominations have started the extraordinary step of rethinking how they do church and adapting to the times. They won't water down the scriptural message, but they change how the message is delivered.

This rethinking or reimagining of church is happening in different ways. Church has become a verb to them and not a noun. Some churches look internally and try to grow spiritually from the inside out, which in turn will help the churches grow and increase discipleship. Programs such as the *Healthy Church Initiative*, the *Vital Church Initiative*, the *Transforming Church Initiative* and the *Organic Growth Plan* are about churches getting healthier, larger and more spiritual. Author Kay Kotan has a book called "Gear Up! Nine Essential Processes for the Optimized Church", that many pastors are using to make important God centered decisions on changing their churches. Many denominations are using the book with much success.

Another way of reimagining church is by looking deeper into redesigning the contemporary church due to cultural shifts. They are redefining what church is. They start with the precept that church is more than a building. Church is more than a sermon. Church is more than just music. To them, church is about relationships and community. Church is about going outside the walls and reaching people where they are in their community: it is not about internal focus and creating more programs. Church is about going out into the community and creating disciples for Christ. Pastor James Emory White addresses this phenomenon in a book called "Rethinking Church: A challenge to Creative Redesign in an Age of Transition". To him, church is not about becoming part of the culture, but by leading it, not letting the culture lead the church. He says that churches need to be intentional about faith development and more missional in order to meet the new realities.

Francis Chan gave up his large San Francisco church when he realized that perhaps he was not doing church the way that God intended. He developed his lay leaders and then sent them out into the neighborhoods to start home churches, and after a year, new lay leaders will emerge, leave, move into other communities, and start new home churches. Some missional churches will have their leadership team move into a blighted area, become a part of the community, and have home churches and minister to the marginalized, poor, drug addicted and those experiencing poverty.

Others are following the Fresh Expressions model, which came out of the Church of England. This model is where you take church to the people, particularly those who left church, or those who were not Christians. All kinds of new churches have been created that might be considered niche, since they are nontraditional.

Church in the park, coffee shop church, dinner church, RV church, church in nature, laundromat church, dinner church, virtual on-line church and pub church are all fresh expressions of this new type of church experience. Having church service on a Tuesday night or some other innovations. Having a conversational church where the pastor teaches interactively to the congregation where they can ask questions. Having Sunday Jazz church and even performing arts churches where the message is delivered through plays, drama, spoken work, interpretive dancing and music instead of by traditional sermons. These are all new imaginative ways that pastors are trying to connect to the congregation in different ways, forming new communities, creating disciples, developing a sense of family and help people grow deeper in their Christian faith.

Some of these ideas are controversial and can be seen in a negative light by traditionalists, but this is the way that churches are going. The modern-day institutional church is splintering in many directions, but the original Christian church was a movement and not an institution. It has moved away from being a movement, but institutions have foundations that movements don't have. So, what exactly is church and where do you see it in the future?
