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### Philippians 4:13 "I can do ALL things through Christ who strengthens me"

June of 2020, this is another month that will be remembered by many people for generations to come. Indeed, June 2020 is one of those months of the COVID-19 pandemic that reminds us of how things used to be. Another reminder of how things were before COVID-19.

I know that it seems like a dream for many of us, thinking about what has happened has also allowed us the opportunity

to reflect about our lives and how to live from now on. Many people feel that this experience has afforded them an opportunity to re-examine their lives, their way of being on this earth; not only here in the USA but all over the world. It is also true that for millions of people around the world, this Pandemic seems as just another drop in the bucket of misfortunes that they are experiencing. People who are living in refugee camps, people who live in the midst of war, people who live without the

basic necessities of life. For many, this pandemic is what they have lived for years, with no relief coming to them. Millions of people die of hunger every year, millions die due to lack of health care, while millions die because they have to work under the most challenging of circumstances (mining without adequate protections, sexual exploitation, slave conditions of different types, etc.).

However, all the things we see in the world remind us that there are many things that we can do to make a difference in the world because we are called by God to be stewards of life. We can make a difference in the middle of the pandemic because we know that God wants the best for all of God's creation: human and non-humans alike. In one of John Wesley's sermons titled: *The Good Steward*, Wesley said: "God has entrusted his creation to us because He loves us. Let us, therefore, be good stewards of his creation because we love Him."

Indeed, stewardship, like everything else in Christian teaching, comes from love. First of all, it is God's love for us, and then we have been entrusted with the world in which we live. Second, our response to God's love must be our love for God's creation: humans and non-human beings.

In Wesley's Explanatory Notes, he makes a poignant and harrowing remark regarding Luke 16:12.

The context of the passage is right after Jesus tells the parable of the Unjust Steward, and proclaims a few profound maxims including the following: "And if you have not been faithful with what belongs to another, who will give you what is your own?" (Luke 16:12, NRSV). Jesus' contention is with the unjust steward acting recklessly with things that are not even his. If someone is so wasteful and dishonest with what he does not

even own, how much more dishonest and wasteful will he be with what he does actually possess? Thus Wesley about our responsibility as God's stewards:

None of these temporal things are yours: you are only stewards of them, not proprietors: God is the proprietor of all; he lodges them in your hands for a season: but still they are his property. Rich men, understand and consider this. If your steward uses any part of your estate (so called in the language

of men) any farther or any otherwise than you direct, he is a knave [dishonest]: he has neither conscience nor honour. Neither have you either one or the other, if you use any part of that estate, which is in truth God's, not yours, any otherwise than he directs.

So, even in this surprising time we find ourselves having to be reminded, again, that everything belongs to God: our lives, our church, our resources, our religious affiliations, our governments (local and national), everything we have, or direct, or control is under the power and judgment of God and must render its accountability to God (Matthew 25:31-41; Romans 13:3-4a). Caring for creation, and, therefore, for the people who live in this earth, our brothers and sisters, our fellow human beings is not only important, but rather, essential to who we are as people of God. For those of us who are part of the household of God (and I pray all of you reading this are), COVID-19, and all the other challenges the world lives -in is part of our responsibility to make it better.

Wesley's point should not be missed. When he refers to "these temporal things" in his sermon, he is referring to everything in this present age, all of God's creation, before the new heavens and new earth. This world in which we live and everything within-it is, as it were, God's estate, and therefore, we are, unequivocally, not proprietors of the estate but stewards—merely stewards.



At the end of our lease, either in our death or when Christ comes back, we will all have to give an account. Those who exploit the "estate" because of greed, neglect the "estate" because of apathy, or abuse the "estate" because of pride have neither, as Wesley puts it, "conscience nor honour."

This is not a Pollyannaish mind-set, this is not a politically correct discourse, this is not about partisan politics, this is not even about being liberal of conservatives, this only has to do with our call as stewards of God's creation to take care of the world; of its governance, of its commerce, of its health care, of its education, etc. As people of God, as the royal priesthood of God, we are called to make a difference in the world. If you have been anointed with God's Spirit (which, if you are a Christian, you have been) then your responsibility for God's creation – human and non-human—is not something any one of us can abrogate.

As the scripture says:

Everywhere and in all things I have learned both to be full and to be hungry, both to abound and to suffer need. *I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me*.

And


...my God shall supply all your needs according to His riches in glory by Christ Jesus. (Philippians 4:12-13 and 19)

# CHILDREN'S MINISTRY NEWS

The children's ministry has been hard at work trying to find ways to engage with the children and families in the program. We have encountered a few obstacles but that has not deterred us from continuing to find ways to not only connect and stay engaged with the kids during this time, but to also grow the program once we are fully open, whenever that takes place. So, a lot of planning is going into this. We are also being forced to rethink the whole ministry considering the covid-19 challenges. We are currently reviewing some of the recommendations

given on reopening the church and thoughts to consider for the children's ministry.

#### These are some of the projects that we are working on:

- We have been discussing and exploring our vacation bible school options, but with using state guidelines and restrictions, we
  believe that it is best to cancel vbs for this summer and look forward to running it the summer of 2021. The health and safety of
  the kids is our priority.
- We are looking into our options for the nursery upon reopening. Based on state guidelines and the recommendations of the conference, we will probably not reopen the nursery until further notice. Since young children pass germs from one to another easily, it is best to not reopen the nursery for a while. We have babies and young children who we must consider.
- Another recommendation was to suspend Sunday School and Grow Time until it is recommended to reopen. The children will sit
  with their parents during service and listen to the Pastor's sermons. We had been moving towards a Family Service type of model for a while and have tried it before. We will supply the kids with lessons and puzzles and discussion points to have with their
  parents when they get home.
- We plan to use Douglas Talks videos, which is a Christian video series for kids with various topics related to the bible. The video will be sent as a separate link in the email to the kids. We will also start posting videos and lessons on the TUMC website and on our Facebook page. We will use other appropriate Christian videos as well.
- Plans are in the works to have an adult teacher shoot a homemade video with their cell phone talking directly to the kids. Some will be generic and discuss their feelings, some will offer encouragement and others will discuss bible stories.
- Will be discussing adding a Children's Ministry Moment to the online services with Pastor Eliezer.
