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In the last few weeks I have been reading Ta-Nehisi Coates' book *Between the World and Me*. This book is a description of someone who experienced what it means to be an American while black. Not long ago, in response to the movement that has sprung forth in support for racial justice in our country, Mr. Coates was asked by Stephen Colbert what did he see in the country right now? Some years before, Coates' response was pessimistic. He was asked if he had hope for America to which he answered with a resounding no. He said, "But I'm not the person you should go to for that. You should go to your pastor; your pastor provides you hope."

At a more recent interview on the Ezra Kline Podcast, Coates' answer was different. The question was: "What does he see right now, as he looks out at the country?" His response was: "I can't believe I'm gonna say this, but I see hope. I see progress right now."

The question of whether this moment of racial reckoning is somehow different than the countless others in our nation's history is on many people's minds. The responses fall somewhere along the spectrum represented by Coates's two very different answers. Never before have so many non-Black people publicly advocated for the well-being of Black people... "this moment feels singular, unique in its possibility for real and lasting change" wrote Drew G.I. Hart in his book about Christianity and race: *Trouble I've Seen*.

Others are less optimistic. After all, there have been so many other moments latent with possibility, so many halting steps toward justice met by fierce resistance from those determined to defend white privilege event when they do not even know what it is that they are defending. This is what writer James Baldwin spoke about regarding our efforts, as a society, to maintain the status quo: "I must honestly confess that I go through moments of disappointment when I have to recognize that there aren't enough white persons in our country who are willing to cherish democratic principles over privilege." Indeed, when people are willing to defend their privilege above the lives of our black and brown brothers and sisters, there is a problem. When the lives of black and brown people are spent at the hands of those who are supposed to protect them, there is something wrong with our social contract.

But what if Ta-Nehisi Coates is right, not about what these days will lead to but about the possibilities they present to us? What would we need to do now to move from possibility to reality?

I ask these questions as a pastor, and a follower of Jesus. Over the centuries white Christians have played the prominent role for creating and sustaining the racial hierarchy which continues to wreak such terrifying havoc today. I think of white Christians who articulated a theology which justified land theft and the genocide of Native Americans, white people who were willing to preach a gospel that legitimized slavery, organized churches which excluded African Americans (included our Methodist Church). A process that was sanctioned in a series of Roman Catholic decrees (i.e., the Doctrine of Discovery, 1493), which codified white supremacy and sanctioned genocide, rape and abuse against African and Native peoples.

These same codes worked to sustained white people's opposition to movements for voter enfranchisement and the integration of schools (as we have seen throughout the twentieth century). Christians who stand proudly for immigration policies that seeks to maintain people outside because they are not like us (as the case with Pat Buchannan's book "State of Emergency: The Third World Invasion and Conquest of America"), regardless of the scriptures' mandate to pursue justice for the oppressed and offer hospitality to the marginalized.

However, the Gospel we have received, the Gospel we have heard offers us a different vision of the world. We have been given a different vision of the social order that God desires in the book of Revelation: "After this I looked, and there before me was a great multitude that no one could count, *from every nation, tribe, people and language,* standing before the throne and before the Lamb." (7:9). This is the people of God, people from every corner of the world whom God has declared God's people. In this count you and I are included, no exceptions, no distinctions, we are the people of God for God is calling us all to be part of God's Household.

If you would like to continue with this conversation, please *join me on a 4 week study on race and what the Bible has to say about it*. This study will take place during the month of September and I am certain that you will not leave this study the same way you came in. I believe that as we explore the scripture we will discover that God is calling us to genuine solidarity with our sisters and brothers of color.

I think that Ta-Nehisi Coates was right when he said that people should go to their pastors for hope. But true Christian hope cannot hide us from us the risky possibility of this moment we are living in. It should disturb us rather than soothe our conscience. Our hope must be marked by a courage which compels us to stand up amid apathy and violence and be counted among those who disturb our world's false sense of peace. "Since we have such a hope," writes the apostle Paul, "we are very bold." (2 Cor 3:12). As followers of Jesus we speak of God's possibilities for we are "God's handiwork, created in the Messiah Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do" (Eph. 2:10).

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Trinity Re-Entering Well Task Force

We want to gather, meet, socialize and worship together. We yearn to live out our missional calling. We are concerned for the social, emotional and spiritual needs of our brothers and sisters in Christ, yet we know it is vitality important for us to stay vigilant and provide protection against COVID-19 and to support the boarder effort to contain COVID-19.

To that end our pastors, staff, and representatives from various ministry teams of the church, make up the recently formed Trinity Re- Entering Well Task Force (TRWTF).

The purpose of the *Re-Entering Well Task Force* is to plan for a *phased in re-opening* of Trinity's campus and provide clear guidance to the congregation, staff, and community as to expectations and changes to worship and other activities, in order to return as safely as possible to in-person gatherings at Trinity United Methodist Church.

Using the best information available from trusted medical and infectious disease personnel, local government mandates and the Baltimore -Washington Conference of the United Methodist Church (BWCUMC) guidelines, the TRWTF will consider three things to determine how and when to re-enter the church building for in-person gatherings (taken from "Guidelines for RE-entering Well," BWCUMC):

For the health and safety of persons who will attend gatherings, the TRWTF must address the following questions:

- WHAT? We will consider the availability of required supplies, such as masks and hand sanitizer, and how we will adhere to all CDC and local health guidelines to mitigate risk.
- WHO? We will consider the percentage of congregants who are vulnerable to the virus, and take into account the high degree of discipline that will be necessary in order for the pastors and congregation to be vigilant about adhering to guidelines and helping others do the same.
- WHERE? We will consider the size and configuration of our space(s) including parking lots, foyers, sanctuary, bathrooms, classrooms, etc. and what that means in terms of meeting health guidelines.

Since the fall of 2017, my family and I have had the privilege of facilitating the Contemporary Issues Grow Time class which has morphed into a Journey of Faith class. As followers of Jesus, each of us is on our own individual path to continue the ministry of Jesus and to enter the eternal kingdom. Over the course of our lives, we have experiences which shape us in many ways. So, it follows that for a Christian, as we go through our individual journey, our experiences should help us to grow in our faith.

Along the way, God may test us, challenge us, or even push us, but, when we are tested, we must be ready. Ask yourself, do you recall a time when you believed that God was testing you? How did you do? What did you do? Did you listen to God or did you go along with your own will? If God were to give you those same tests again today, would the result be the same or would your response be different due to your growth as a Christian?

This brings us to the question: how do we continue to grow as Christians? First, we must understand and accept that this is a life-long journey. We often think that church is the first and last step, but, it is only a small part of the experience. As the Bible quote indicates, we should always strive to increase our knowledge. This requires Christians to read the Bible, outside of church, and to read other Christian books. Attending classes or seminars if one is able, can provide more opportunities for Christians to participate in fellowship, and to continue in their spiritual growth. Another component involves prayer and meditation. Prayer is mentioned throughout the Bible and it is essential for Christian growth. Some believe that a good prayer life is the most neglected aspect of our journey.

Lastly, have you acted on your faith? In James 2:14-17, the Bible tells us that faith without works is dead. In verse 18, we are told that "...I by my works will show you my faith." Together, all of these actions or "experiences" will shape us as Christians and as we continue our path we will grow. However, we must be diligent in these efforts, we must persevere, for if we stop, we stunt our growth in the faith. Each step of our journey should bring us closer to God. Our growth manifests itself in many ways such as sharing our faith with others, practicing grace, and showing forgiveness. We begin to adopt the mindset of Christ. Ultimately, this should lead us to the greatest and first commandment from Matthew 22:37, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind." The first, Jesus shows us, makes no sense without the second part in verse 39: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself."

Remember, a pastor is not solely responsible for one's spiritual growth, we have to take personal responsibility for our journey. Faith is not just an experience, it is a journey.

Research shows that reaching out and asking how someone who is thinking about suicide provides connection and relief and that their thoughts of suicide are reduced. 
