Back to school, back to church, back to...normal? I think I hoped that would be the case when we started planning this fall.

But nope. I know that Aaron and I had to cancel our original plans to travel to Utah this month for Zeke to finally meet his great-grandmother, but we can't go now as the pandemic surges around us. My dad works for a school system in another county, and they have been sent home early from work because people protesting the school's mask policy have been

aggressive toward employees. Even some people who have been vaccinated are coming up positive. And now here I am, your pastor, telling you to come back to church and go about life as normal? No! That's not what I mean. When we are talking about getting back to church September 12, I mean let's get back to living faithfully, however that looks for us.

Getting back to living faithfully doesn't mean going back to "normal." It does not even mean encouraging people to join us to worship in person, especially if you are high risk because you are unvaccinated or have autoimmune issues. Our Re-Entering Well Task Force has reinstated masking in the building and are continuing to monitor best practices living in this pandemic.

Getting back to living faithfully means reorienting ourselves. Here we are, in a new school year, with a new program schedule for church, and we can make a new schedule for our own lives. Maybe you have slipped away from regular worship, study, prayer, and service because of the pandemic or summer activities. Maybe you are just kind of stuck in spiritual practices that aren't connecting you anymore, or in study that isn't challenging anymore. So now we can get back to church to dive deeper into a life of faith.

Let's come back to church for regular worship, online or in person. Let's come back to church for Bible study- most of our options there are hybrid too! You can always start your own small group, even with the people in your home. Mission and service opportunities are still happening, even if they look different than they did before the pandemic. Youth group is gearing up and we would love to have more young people and even some older volunteers! Come back and connect with the One who provides peace in the chaos. Come back and experience community with others trying to live differently. Come back and find hope- not hope that everything will go back to normal but hope that God will show us the way forward.

In the book of Jeremiah, the people are struggling with exile. Their whole world came crashing down around them. But Jeremiah still gave them a word of hope in chapter 31:

Thus says the Lord: Keep your voice from weeping, and your eyes from tears; for there is a reward for your work, says the Lord: they shall come back from the land of the enemy; ¹⁷there is hope for your future, says the Lord: your children shall come back to their own country.

The exile came to an end, as God promised, though the world was totally different. But still, there was hope for the future- is hope for the future.

There is reward for this work of coming back, my friends. We might not see it at first, but there is hope for the future. Let us live into it, and come back to church.

BIBLE VERSES:

"Do not judge, so that you may not be judged...." Matthew 7:1-4

"There is one lawgiver and judge who is able to save and to destroy. So who, then, are you to judge your neighbor?" James 4:12

"...Therefore you have no excuse, whoever you are, when you judge others; for in passing judgement on an other you condemn yourself, because you, the judge are doing the very same things." *Romans 2:1*

Since the fall of 2017, my family and I have had the privilege of facilitating the Contemporary Issues Grow Time class which has morphed into a Journey of Faith class. As members of the class discussed their faith, several of them often made statements that resonated with all of us. We started documenting the quotes and often would cite the quotes during a later class, usually putting them up on the board. I wanted to share some of these quotes with other members of Trinity to spark conversation.

Recently, my husband was involved in a conversation with another Christian from his job at a faith-based nonprofit organization outside of Trinity. The conversation started because my husband chose to wear a mask to work. The other Christian individual questioned this decision and by default, questioned my husband's faith. He said "As a Christian, you shouldn't be afraid of Covid. You don't need to wear a mask or get the vaccine because you're covered by the blood of Jesus. If you get sick it's because your faith isn't strong enough or you're not really a true Christian." This belief (and similar beliefs) is not unique among other Christians.

The purpose of this article is not to address one's decision on whether or not to wear a mask or to obtain the vaccine. Rather, the focus of my article deals with our rush to judge others who do not necessarily hold the same doctrinal view as them. In Romans 14:1-12, Paul reminds us that we should not judge others. In Matthew 7:1, Jesus tells us "**Do not judge or you too will be judged...**" We read the verses and understand them, but sometimes as Christians we have difficulty following these words. What makes one Christian qualified to judge another individual's fitness as a Christian? What makes another Christian qualified to determine the fate of another fellow Christian?

Many years ago, during a conversation with another Christian (from a different denomination), I was informed that I was going to hell because they thought that I was not a "true" Christian based on my own Southern Baptist beliefs at the time. The former church that my family attended prior to joining Trinity, prided itself on being a true "bible believing" church. Last time I checked, all protestant denominations such as Methodists, Baptists, Presbyterians, etc., as well as Catholics, believed in the bible, but had different interpretations or understanding of scripture. It is so easy to look at others and judge them, but how often do we look in the mirror to take a pulse on our own walk with Christ? How often do we take a look at our own personal growth over time as a Christian? Where are we on our own individual faith journey?

In a recent sermon, Pastor Shannon talked about returning to who God intends for us to be. Perhaps, instead of focusing so much on judging others, we should focus on our own faith journey. Instead of judging or condemning others, shouldn't we as followers of Jesus focus on showing love and uplifting others, especially during these trying times? Maybe we should focus more on praying for our brothers and sisters and praying for God to fix our own brokenness. From Ephesians 4:29 we are reminded **"Let no evil talk come out of your mouths but only what is useful for building up, as there is need, so that your words may give grace to those who hear."**

September is National Pain Awareness month. People experience chronic pain at a rate that is more than diabetes, cancer and heart disease combined in the US. Chronic pain is persistent pain that lasts three months or long. Pain can range from mild to severe and may

change depending on many factors.

Take a moment to assess your own body. How does it feel? Think about those around you who may be living with pain. The truth is that pain is a part of life and considered a warning sign that something is wrong in the body. Pain impacts people differently. There are those who may have severe or chronic pain, for a variety of reasons, that impacts daily life.

People with chronic pain may also experience depression. Coping with pain can be challenging. When it is difficult to manage daily activities of life, due to pain, the burden of managing emotions becomes more difficult.

In one study, people were asked if pain impacted their ability to do things. 78% said it was difficult to carry groceries, 75% said yard work was more difficult, 65% found housework to be challenging and 66% found home maintenance harder. This can impact mood.

One survey tells of the burden pain has on individuals and their loved ones. Four out of five people rely on friends and family for help, with half relying on spouses. However, nine out of ten people living with chronic pain don't ask for help because they don't want to be a burden.

Chronic pain can be a challenging problem. It is okay to ask for help.

Our guest preacher to celebrate Hispanic Heritage Month and World Communion Sunday on October 3 will be a familiar face: Rev. Dr. Giovanni Arroyo. Trinity supported him as a candidate for ministry and now welcomes him back as the new General Secretary of the denomination's General Commission on Religion and Race. Check out this press release that announces his new ministry:

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The Rev. Dr. Giovanni Arroyo, an ordained elder and member of the Baltimore-Washington Annual Conference, has been elected as the General Secretary (chief executive) for The United Methodist Church's General Commission on Religion and Race, effective August 31, 2021.

Bishop Cynthia Moore-Koikoi, president of the Commission's board of directors, made the announcement July 6.

"The board cannot wait to see how God is going to use the tremendous gifts God has given Dr. Arroyo as he takes the lead chair of the agency. His experience, talent, and lifelong commitment to the work of dismantling racism is invaluable at this critical juncture in the life of the church and the world," the bishop said.

With his election, the Rev. Dr. Arroyo will be the first-ever Latinx person to head a denomination-wide agency. "I am humbled, honored and excited for the opportunity to lead The General Commission on Religion and Race in its ongoing innovative work," said Arroyo. "*Le doy gracias a Dios por los líderes que han sido parte de mi formación para que hoy puede dirigir GCORR hacia la próxima etapa del trabajo de justicia racial alrededor del mundo. Les pido sus oraciones para que Dios sea manifestado en todo lo que hagamos.*"

(English translation: "I give thanks to God for the leaders that have been part of my formation so that today I can lead GCORR to its next phase of racial justice work globally. I ask for your prayers so God can be manifested in all that we do.")

The Rev. Dr. Arroyo has worked for the Commission as Team Leader for Monitoring and Advocacy, and since 2013 as Team Leader for Program Ministries. Born in Puerto Rico and raised in New York City, he started professional ministry in 2001 as pastor of Iglesia Metodista Unida El Camino and served as one of three chaplains caring for families, victims, and survivors of the 9/11 terrorist attack on the World Trade Center. He was at Bellevue Hospital where 287 survivors received medical care following the attack, and also comforted family members at the city morgue.

The Rev. Dr. Arroyo previously served cross-racial/cross-cultural pastorates in both New York and Baltimore-Washington conferences, while also leading Religion and Race and Hispanic-Latinx ministries. Before becoming ordained, he was a researcher at The City College of New York in language acquisition and experimental psychology. He did further research at the New York State Psychiatric Institute on exposure to violence and child abuse and at the National Development and Research Institute with young adult drug users. He also served as adjunct faculty, teaching English as a second language and world religions.

Deaconess M. Garlinda Burton, who has been serving as interim executive during the GCORR board search process, also applauded Dr. Arroyo's election.

"Giovanni is one of the most potent United Methodist voices for racial justice, not just for the church in the United States, but across our worldwide communion," Ms. Burton said. "To elect him Religion and Race's General Secretary in this moment gives me assurance that this Commission's work of helping build God's just and peaceable kin-dom will move to its next great level."




